Kid Rescued from Tree Well at Whistler



Two Mt. High club members, **Dave and Colleen Myers** were skiing at Whistler-Blackcomb on Dave's birthday, April 8th, when Dave got one of the best presents ever; he got to help a child from a very dangerous situation. The two were skiing down one of the main groomed runs at medium speed and as they passed a small group of about three trees in a triangular formation, close together, in an odd place toward

the right-middle of a groomed run. They heard this quiet, high pitched, frightened voice calling out "please help, please help me." They stopped and didn't see anyone at first. They wondered where the voice coming from. Then, upon looking up the hill, they spotted a young child in the middle of the three large trees with his skis caught across the two uphill trees. The skis were just long enough to cover the span between two trees, and his mid-section was well below the level of the snow on the run; he was falling



into the tree well and his head and arms were struggling to keep him out of the well on the downhill side as his body was long enough to span the well. They'd seen others coming down near him but he was so hard to see that most passed by him and about the fourth person they were able to flag down to help from above asking him to meet Dave at these trees. Dave walked up the hill about 50 yards and reached the boy, who was fine but frightened. The other person positioned himself above the tree well and as Dave held the child's upper body the other person released one of his two still attached ski bindings. The boy started to settle deeper into the well becoming more frightened. Dave asked the other person to wait before undoing the final ski, and instructed the young boy to turn the free leg so that the trees will not be in the way when the second ski was released as his foot was between branches that could hold him there, he did so with a little struggle but freed his leg and foot from the V of the branch. Then the child held onto Dave with all his strength as the second ski was unhooked. When the ski was released his lower body went into the well and the child's face showed signs of panic, but he did keep his composure as Dave assured him he's got him and will not let go. Dave pulled back and downhill and the youngster came out of the hole like a cork from a wine bottle, and Dave and the boy both slid down the hill 10-20 yards to a safe spot on the groomed run; that part was fun. They helped the youngster, who turned out to be a 10-year old boy from England get back into his skies. He thanked the two rescuers very graciously and skied a short distance down to his mom who'd been watching and waiting. He then said to her, "Did you see that!? I almost got stuck in a tree well!" His mother politely thanked the rescuers and then told the boy she had seen what happened and advised him, in a kind motherly tone, please avoid skiing near any more trees the rest of the trip, OK? The boy humbly agreed. Then everyone went on their separate paths down the mountain at the beautiful but always dangerous Whistler Blackcomb resort in beautiful British Columbia, Canada. Dave and Colleen had good things happen to them the rest of the trip...Karma!

Attend educational leadership panel sessions (thisyear's topics will be Avalanche Safety and Equipment), meet and greet with ski personalities like Billy Kidd and Jess McMillan, and attend the awards banquet and dance on Saturday night. There will be a business meeting on Sunday, at which time officers are elected, and

other Association business takes place, as well as a sponsored Brunch, and LOTS of door prizes to be given away. All of these events (and meals!) are included in your registration fee.

Also available (for an additional fee) are optional events such as the Thursday Night Pub Crawl, Michael German Memorial Golf Tournament, The Hike at Smith Rock State Park, or the fun-filled "Shop-Dine-Wine" trip to the Old Mill District.

How do WE and our CLUB benefit?

Mountain High Board of Directors has voted to reimburse club members who attend the convention as full voting delegates up to \$600 to be divided between registered attendees. In addition, there are other incentives that will come directly back to Mountain High. These include:

Northwest Council will pay Mountain High \$154 for 1 person who attends Convention, provided at least 1 other club member pays and attends the entire convention, including Caucuses on Saturday to meet the candidates, and through Sunday morning's business meeting and elections.

Far West is offering the 6-pack incentive again this year. This offer provides 1 free registration (\$154) with every 6 paid. The reimbursement comes AFTER the convention. So, if we send 6, we'd get back \$154. If we send 12, we'd get back \$308. And, even though some of us, who are on the Council Board, are being reimbursed by the Council, we would count in these numbers to help increase our total number of delegate attending.

North America's median vertical is 603 feet, and that is at New Winterplace in West Virginia, where we enjoyed skiing on a pleasant January afternoon. Median vertical means that half the resorts have more than 603 feet and half have less. Nevertheless, huge ski operations work well on 600 feet. The Boyne ski areas in Michigan are loaded with luxury condos, hotels and beautiful lodges. Their lifts absolutely line the 600-foot ridges for what seems like miles, making up in horizontal for the typical stacked lifts on taller mountains.

Stay tuned for the next part of the journey, including Virginia, West Virginia, Colorado, Wyoming, and Idaho.

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Sun Peaks Canada's 2nd largest

Sun Peaks Resort in British Columbia will build new trails in the resort's West Morrisey and Gil's area, increasing the area to 4,200 acres for the 2014-2015 ski season and making it one of the largest in and joint second biggest in Canada, equal to Lake Louise, but after Whistler Blackcomb.

Sun Peaks is located near the town of Kamloops, on Canada's highway 5, which ican be seen as an extension of Interstate 5. It's approximately an 11 hour drive from Portland, OR.

Sun Peaks consists of three connected hills: Mt. Tod, Sundance Mt., and Mt. Morrisey, with a European style pedestrian village in the middle.

Utah 2nd Largest in the World

Ski Utah, a marketing and trade organization and representatives from Alta, Brighton, Canyons, Deer Valley, Park City Mountain Resort, Snowbird, and Solitude held a joint news conference on March 19, 2014, to announce their support for a connection between all seven of the resorts via chairlift and ski runs, forming a European-style mega resort to be called ONE Wasatch.

This would create North America's largest ski resort, with 18,000 skiable acres, and it would be the world's second largest, after France's **Les Trois Vallées** with 24,711 acres, but larger than Italy's **Sella Ronda**, currently the world's second-largest with 16,800 acres.

For now, this is just an idea. But once a consensus is reached, the resorts say that the connecting lifts could be installed in a single summer's construction cycle.

Mt. Ashland did not open

Mt. Ashland in southern Oregon did not open its slopes to skiing at all this past winter season (2013/2014) for lack of snow.

Whitefish Mt. New Lift

Whitefish Mountain Resort (aka "Big Mountain") will install a fixed-grip triple chairlift on the north side of the mountain for 2014/2015 -- opening new runs from the top of Flower Point and adding an additional 200 acres of lift-served terrain. The Base Lodge will undergo a half-million dollar renovation this summer, with an expansion of the food court area, window access from the outside patio area and a new indoor seating area.

New Speed Record

An Italian speed skier has broken his own eight-year old speed record by a little under one mile per hour to set a new speed skiing record – the fastest speed man has travelled on land without mechanized propulsion.

Racing on the intimidating Chabrières speed run at the French resort of Vars as part of the Speed Masters event, Simone Origone reached 156.87 miles per hour.

Wolf Mt. Renamed

Wolf Mountain ski area in Utah's Ogden Valley has been purchased by an investor group called Skyline Mountain Base, after Wolf Mt. went into bankruptcy. Next ski season, it will reopen as **Skyline Mountain**.

Crystal Mt. Avalanche destroys chairlift

March 10, 2014. (Monday) An avalanche destroyed the High Campbell (aka chair 6) at Crystal Mountain, Washington. The avalanche was intentionally set off by the resort's ski patrol after the resort was closed to the public...no one was hurt. Fred Noble Has Passed Away

The mountain community suffered a great loss on Thursday when skier, philanthropist and Mount Hood legend **Fred Noble** died on May 1, 2014 after a long battle with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS).

"Fred made it to May 1st for various reasons," wrote his daughter **Julie Bakkala** in a letter to friends. "It

was his ex-wife's birthday and his grand daughter's birthday, as well as the day he had to reach in order for the VA to pay a portion of his enormous caregiver cost. We have no idea how he knew all of this, as he was in a sleeping state in those last few days, but we can only guess that he wanted to be in control until the end in typical Noble style."

Born and raised in Portland, Noble traveled the world as a skier and an adventurer, starred in Warren Miller films, and pioneered helicopter skiing in British Columbia, paragliding in the Cascades and windsurfing in the Columbia River Gorge. He dedicated himself to battling ALS since being

diagnosed with the incurable disease in 2010, and raised over \$480,000 for the cause through Ski to Defeat ALS.

He served as Honorary Chair of the 2014 Ski to Defeat ALS event at Mt. Hood Meadows on April 12, and was honored with the Noble Spirit Award. Also very much worth reading is **Fred's Facebook page**, which is brimming with memories, wishes and hilarious stories from the Fredinator's many friends and fellow adventurers. These tales of practical jokes, epic powder days, sit-skiing mishaps and adventurous road trips capture the man's big-hearted zest for life.

"Fred is crushing some pow and hanging it off some cliff in the sky," wrote Fred's friend **Tracy Livingston**. "Big turns my friend. We will make one last run when ever I see you next."

A documentary about Fred's life and battle with ALS, <u>The Noble Spirit</u>, has drawn high praise in its Hood

River and Portland screenings and should be available for viewing at other locations soon. In the meantime, the memories and thanks continue to pour in for Fred Noble.

Here's what Lance Christian, executive director of the ALS Association's Oregon & SW Washington Chapter

wrote on the day of Fred's death:

"Working with Fred to create resources for ALS services and ALS research has been an honor. But, we also learned you had to watch Fred closely. He had that unique skill to forge ahead and do his own thing and then ask permission later. Some might call that trait a "pain in the rear." We preferred to call it "The Fred Noble experience!" Jump first, ask questions later and know you are doing well for others. You could not help but love Fred for his enthusiasm and his determination.

"Every time we lose a person to ALS, a unique light in the firmament is

extinguished. With Fred gone, the sky will have one less brilliant star shining forth. But, we take comfort for having witnessed the beauty of his life. While Fred's light may be extinguished, our cause is now surrounded by the light of his family and friends who continue his good works. Where Fred's light shone there are now dozens, hundreds, thousands of light that will continue to light the way until there is a cure for ALS.

"That is a legacy to be proud of. Thank you Fred."
