Lift tickets and Season Passes

Here is a comparison of various lift tickets and passes. Which pass is best for you depends on how much you'll ski. Will you ski enough times at the same ski area to justify a season pass? Note that PACRAT racers will be able to get discounted lift tickets on their race days.

Remember that Meadows and Timberline will be offering **Spring Passes** valid for March, April and May, for about \$100 - \$130. Consider buying a 5 day or 10 day pass plus a Spring Pass, and they don't have to be at the same ski area. Also, note the following changes from last year:

- 1. The Fusion Pass / Powder Alliance has increased from 13 to 14 ski areas. Whitewater was just added.
- 2. Mt. Bachelor has discontinued the 12 free days at other ski areas. In it's place is the new M.A.X Pass.
- 3. The Mountain Collective Pass has added Ski Banff-Lake Louise and Sunshine, for a total of 14 ski areas.
- 4. Most prices will increase after November 8.

Canada trip Silver Star / Sun Peaks

January 24 - 30, 2016. (5 ski days / 6 nights)

Silver Star has a mellow front side and a couple of really long cruisers on the back side, but it is famous for its steep and challenging powder runs on the back



side. Tree skiing. Powder. Best of all, a ski-in/ski-out village located not at the bottom but in the middle of the mountain. The village has a wild-west town look but in pastel colors! It is the locals' favorite mountain. And it is part of the Powder Alliance, which means that anyone with a Fusion Pass can ski there all 3 days for free!

Silver star has 128 named trails on 2,500' vertical, served by 12 lifts, 3 of which are hi-speed quads. Try to ski all the 5 distinct areas: the Front side (Vance Creek), the Back side (Putnam Creek), Silver Woods, Attridge, and Alder Point (advanced hike-to area). Silver Star also has 106 km of cross-country trails.

Sun Peaks is just 2.5 hours away, and we'll move there for the last 3 nights. Sun Peaks has a European village themed ski-in/ski-out village, with a pedestrian street lined with boutique stores and cafes. There are 3 separate peaks to ski: Mt. Tod, Sundance, and Mt. Morrisey. Lots of hidden nooks and crannies. Don't miss the "Sticks" and the "Back in Time" trail on Mt. Morrisey, Also, you have to try some of the steep trails on Mt. Morrisey with washing machine names, such as "Agitator", "Static Cling", "Spin Cycle", etc.

Sun Peaks is the 2nd largest ski area in Canada. It has 133 named trails (one of them 5 miles long), 2,894' vertical, served by 11 lifts, 3 of which are high speed quads.

This will be a bus trip. We'll pick up in Portland and in Vancouver, WA. We'll spend 3 days at Silver Star, and then an additional 2 days/3 nights at Sun Peaks.

Prices: Adult full price = \$1,095Senior full price = \$1,033Adults with Fusion Pass = \$888Senior w. Fusion Pass = \$849

Price includes all bus transportation, lodging, and lift tickets. Two lunches (on the way up and on the return trip) are included. Depending on the number of people that sign up (the more the

better) and the rate of exchange with the Canadian dollar, if we end up with any surplus, we will include some breakfasts and/or dinners too.

Space was limited to 32 people. We managed to squeeze in 35. **This trip is now FULL**, as of the end of October 2015. If you want to be on the waiting list, in case someone cancels, please contact **Karen Michels**.

Full payment due by November 15, 2015. No refunds after November 15 unless you can fill your spot. See our Mt. High Trip Cancellation Policy on our TRIPS web page.

Montana trip Discovery Mt. / Lost Trail

February 21 - 27, 2016. (5 ski days / 6 nights)

Something unique! Kurt Krueger and Emilio Trampuz did some scouting in February 2015 and discovered a couple of hidden gems in southwest Montana. We want to take you there.



Discovery ski area. This was quite a find! Last winter was a bad snow year in the West, but the day we arrived we got 4 inches of wonderful fresh powder here on top of a very good base. You want challenge? You'll find it here. Over a dozen double-black never groomed named runs in the back bowls! This is like skiing in the Chugach mountains, but without the need for a helicopter! Even the blue cruisers seem very long, with a consistent pitch.

Discovery offers 2,400 vertical feet, 2,200 acres, served by 5 triples and 2 double chairs. Beginners and lower intermediates have their own hill. The best feature is: no crowds!

Lost Trail Powder Mountain. A great place, lots of powder, and no crowds. This place is open only Thursdays thru Sundays. Any snow that falls in the first half of the week will be untouched on Thursday. We will time our trip to arrive there on Thursday!

Lost Trail is located on the border between Montana and Idaho, and you can ski both sides. Yes, just like Lookout Pass, only bigger! It offers 1,800 vertical feet, served by 5 double chairlifts. The Montana side has several double-black runs. Best feature: No crowds, and an enormous field of perfectly spaced thin trees, where you can leave an unlimited number of fresh tracks while doing slalom laps through the trees.

Both Discovery Mt. and Lost Trail were featured in the 2014 Warren Miller ski film: "No Turning Back".

This will be a bus trip. We'll pick up in Portland and Troutdale. 2 days/2 nights in Philipsburg (Discovery ski area), and 2 days/3 nights in Hamilton (near the Lost Trail ski area). Bonus: we'll also hit the Montana Snowbowl, near Missoula, one day. This will be a very unique trip. Experience the pristine side of Montana!



Price = \$825 per person.

Montana ski areas don't offer a senior discount. But we got a good deal on group tickets.

Price includes all bus transportation, lodging, and lift tickets. Two lunches (on the way up and on the return trip) are included. Also, a dinner in Philipsburg. Depending on the number of people that sign up (the more the better), if we end up with any surplus, we will include another dinner.

Space is limited to 32 people. We cannot include more because of lodging limitations. Also, this trip will be open to members of other clubs as well, so please sign up early!

To reserve your spot: Please send in a deposit check of \$250 per person, preferably by November 15, 2015.

Full payment due by January 15, 2016. No refunds after January 15, unless you can fill your spot. See our Trip Cancellation Policy.

Crystal Mountain, WA Mt.High

March 18-20, 2016 A weekend bus trip, 2 nights/2 days. We leave Friday around 5:00 pm. Lots of fun on the bus – this is the best way to get to know other club members! We'll return Sunday by 8:30 pm.

Crystal Mountain is the largest ski area in Washington with 3,100 vertical feet of skiing, with over 50 named runs. There's everything from gentle

groomed cruising runs for beginners to challenging steeps - backcountry, glades, chutes and unbelievable black runs for the more adventurous. This is why SKIING Magazine voted Crystal Mountain the #7 top mountain in North America.

2016 Mt. High Trips

There is one 8-passenger gondola (included in all tickets as of this year), 2 six-pack hi-speed lifts, 2 hi-speed quads, 2 triples, and 3 doubles., serving 2,300 acres of lift served terrain, plus 500 acres of backcountry.

NEWS: Two lifts have been replaced by new ones :

1. The High Campbell Chairlift, for experts only, which was destroyed in an avalanche this past season, was replaced by a new fixed grip double chairlift made by SkyTrac, the only American ski lift manufacturer.

2. The Quicksilver fixed-grip double chairlift, serving intermediate terrain, was replaced by a fixed-grip quad lift.

Lodging: We'll stay in the town of Enumclaw, 45 minutes from the mountain. Most of us will be in queen beds, but the first 3 couples who sign up and request it will get a king bed. There is no breakfast in the hotel, but there's Charlie's Cafe, a breakfast place right across the parking lot that opens at 5 am.

Price = \$250. This includes all bus transportation, 2 nights' lodging, one dinner, and one lift ticket.

The reason for only one lift ticket is that on Sunday, March 20, Crystal Mountain is allowing all NWSCC club members to buy tickets at half price, but you have to go to the ticket window yourself and show your NWSCC card (i.e. your club membership card; you'll get it when you renew your club membership for this season).

Use the **Dough Transmittal form** on the page before last (or on our FORMS web page) to send **\$100 deposit**, due by November 30. Full payment due by February 15, 2015. The Largest Resort in the US

Vail Resorts has purchased Park City for \$182.5 million last year (2014). This year, they combined Park City and the Canyons into a single resort named simply **Park City Mountain Resort**. This is now the largest ski resort in the United States with 7,300 acres, 17 peaks, 14 bowls, served by 38 lifts. Vail Resorts is spending \$50 million on upgrades, including a gondola connecting the resorts, two lifts and new restaurants - all ready for 2015-2016.

The Newest Resort in the US

CHERRY PEAK OPENS IN UTAH

Winter Forecast

Continuing our discussion of the upcoming winter predictions. See part 1 on page 13 of our September 2015 issue (Lift Lines 177).

Winter Storms vs. El Niño

What can we expect from this winter? This is a very strong El Niño year, stronger than usual. This should bring a warmer and dryer than average winter in the Northwest while California, New Mexico, and Arizona should get wetter, with plenty of snow in the mountains. Generally speaking this does not bode well for snow enthusiasts in Oregon.

However, meteorologists also tell us that most of the annual snowpack usually comes from just 2 or 3 major storms. Storms are unpredictable. A big one could hit us even in an El Niño year.

El Niño sets the general trend, but individual storms can still happen.

Data from past years seems to confirm this. It shows that not all El Niño years were bad for Oregon and good for California.

For example, in California, El Niño produced wet years in 1983 and 1998, but also dry years in 1931 and 1988.

In Oregon, data from Mt. Hood Meadows shows that some very strong El Niño years, such as 1983, brought above average snow amounts to Mt. Hood. But other strong El Niño years such as 1998 brought below average snow amounts. Interestingly, even that below average year brought more snow than this past 2015 winter did.

Conclusions & Thoughts

First, let's acknowledge that weather is unpredictable, and climate change is a factor too. So, nobody knows. With that in mind, here are some additional thoughts.

1. WARMER? Even if El Niño brings us warmer weather than average, we are talking only a few degrees warmer than average. On any give day, does it make a big difference if the temperature is 28°F instead of 24°F? The snow might be a bit wetter, that's all.

2. DRYER? Dryer conditions mean less precipitation. Less snow? OK, but nobody ever said there will be NO snow. Just less of it. Whether it's 10 or 20 feet of snow won't make a big difference to skiers. We can't really tell how much snow is under foot anyway.

3. TRIPS. In places like Montana and British Columbia, some of us have experienced very cold temperatures in past years. Minus 20°F in Montana is not unusual. In British Columbia, some of us have skied in minus 30°F. So, a bit warmer than that would be very welcome!

In conclusion, there WILL be snow this year. Regardless of whether it's a bit below or above average, we'll have fun on the mountain!

The only question is the quality of the snow. Will it be dry powder or wet cement? Hey, we are used to wet cement here in the Pacific Northwest! Bring it on!

In Memory of Henry Bendinelli

Aug. 12, 1924 - Oct. 27, 2015.



Henry Bendinelli was the founder and president of the Mt. Hood Ski Kats Club. He passed away peacefully, after a battle with cancer, on Tuesday, October 27.

He was born and raised in Portland, Oregon, but he always treasured his Italian ancestry. He served as an aerial navigator on B-29

bombers, both in World War 2 and in the Korean war.

He was had a career as a stockbroker, but his heart was on the snowy slopes. He worked as a ski instructor at Timberline, so he could afford to take his four children skiing. Many of his clients became his friends and by the 1970s, they decided to form a ski club to stay in touch and to extend their skiing fun through trips to other ski areas. Some of his favorite were Sun Valley, Whitefish Mountain (Big Mountain), and Sun Peaks.

Henry often quoted the following two sayings, which he also embodied in his life: "Skiing is not a sport; it's a way of life." (*Otto Schneibs*), and "Skiers live a long time" (*Hjalmar Hvam*).

Henry certainly proved this true in his own life. Not only did he live long, he skied even at the age of 91.

He came on at least one of our Mountain High bus trips to Anthony Lakes. On that trip he got the whole bus singing along with him. He always had a song or a poem or a funny story up his sleeve. He was active till the very end. He skied at both Sun Valley and Timberline just this past winter. Then, just a month ago, on September 29, he sent out an email about his health and his concern about the Ski Kats club. He

said: "Despite all of Henry's longevity, now 91 years old, the time will to come when he can no longer organize trips and events. It is



time to find new leadership---so that good times such as this are to continue. Will address that tomorrow." Sadly, that "tomorrow" never came.

Henry seems to have had a wonderful life, full of excitement, doing the things he liked to do most: skiing, biking, and dancing with the ladies! And when the day arrived that he couldn't do it any more, ... well, what's the point of hanging around any longer, eh?!!!!

Henry is now "flying" on his heavenly skis somewhere, whooping, hollering, and yodeling all the way down the mountain! There's got to be skiing up there. It wouldn't be true paradise without some beautiful slopes covered in pure white!
